2016 Hottenstein Reunion Picnic to be Sunday, June 12th, at the Hottenstein Mansion, Kutztown

The 80th Hottenstein Reunion, the family picnic gathering, will be held on Sunday, June 12, 2016 at Hottenstein Mansion, on Route 222, east of Kutztown, Pennsylvania. The Reunion will begin in the morning, with the traditional catered picnic with strawberries, shortcake & ice cream for dessert, to be served at 1:00 PM. All are welcome.

Rob and Jennette Reynolds have again invited us to gather at the Hottenstein Mansion which he describes as the home of the Hottenstein family. We will be the guests of Dr. Reynolds, his family, and the Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County. Dr. Reynolds is the curator of the Mansion; he and his family reside in the home.

In addition to visiting the Hottenstein Mansion, we will have the catered Family Picnic on Sunday at the Mansion. This is a time when family members are able to visit, share experiences, and socialize. During this time, we will have our Reunion business meeting. Dr. Reynolds and his family will explain the home, period furniture, and Hottenstein artifacts will be displayed.

Hottenstein Cemetery --Donations Focus for the Historic Preservation Trust

Access to, any remediation, and the repair of the Hottenstein Cemetery, associated with the Hottenstein property and which is across the road from the Hottenstein Homestead, has become a focus for the Hottenstein Reunion. This historical cemetery is the



burial place of the donors of the Hottenstein property, Dr. David Fulmer Hottenstein and

Mary Alice De Turk Hottenstein, who gave the Hottenstein Homestead to the Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County. It is also the burial place for other ancestors. The Reunion officers developed this focus from a range of identified needs associated with the Hottenstein Homestead property.

In recent years, reaching the cemetery occurred by randomly walking through a field, an access way could not be identified. There are deed references for the tract exclusion and the right of way to the cemetery. The deed for the Hottenstein Cemetery is held by the Historic Trust. Road. After turning on to Hottenstein Road, proceed past the Manison, turn around, and park on the West side of the road or facing South toward Route 222.

Handicapped parking will be provided in the parking area on the east side of the Hottenstein-Mansion.

2015 Hottenstein Family Reunion Meeting Minutes June 14, 2015, At the Mansion, Kutztown, Pennsylvania

The 79th Annual Hottenstein Reunion was held at the Hottenstein Mansion in Kutztown, PA on June 14, 2015 with 55 persons attending. Dinner began at 1:15 PM. It was a wonderful dinner consisting of fried chicken, roast fresh ham, scalloped potatoes, string beans, baked lima beans, tossed salad, fruit salad, rolls & butter and cold bottled water. Dessert was strawberries, shortcake and vanilla ice cream.

President Terry Schnure welcomed everyone and we had a group picture taken, This was followed by the dinner. There was no wagon to shuttle us from the nearby church due to the death of the tractor driver so parking was on the opposite berm of Hottenstein Road for those who could not fit in the mansion parking area.

President Terry Schnure opened the business meeting with thanks once again, especially to Dr. Reynolds, curator of the Mansion, his wife Jennette and their daughter, Reanna. The Secretary's report was included in the newsletter which was previously mailed to everyone and the Treasurer's and Historian's reports were passed around. These reports were accepted by the Reunion.

We observed a minute of silence for those of us who departed this life in the past year and for loved ones from years past, and family members, known and unknown, to each of us.

Terry talked about a book written by Bill Hottenstein from Wisconsin regarding the family's origins in Germany.

Election of officers for 2015-2016 then took place. The following slate of officers was elected:

Terry announced that \$600 had been raised in 2015 to date for the Trust. (With subsequent donations, the total donated in 2015 was \$1,150.)

Terry also announced that Cathryn Hottenstein donated a book about Berks County history with two Hottensteins in it, one being David H. Hottenstein. ...

He explained the Reunion has a website which needs to be brought up-to-date and maintained; he asked for a family member to volunteer to be its webmaster. In the future, it would be advantageous for more correspondence to be done electronically, utilizing the web site as a Hottenstein Reunion resource.

Then Dr. Reynolds, in his remarks, informed us that Route 222 will be widened in 10-18 years or so. He is on an advisory board for the widening of Route 222 between Kutztown and Reading. He and his students from Kutztown University have been photographing all historic buildings in Maxatawny Township. The PA Historical & Museum Society has determined that there is a Hottenstein Historical District from Route 222 back at least one-half mile. He and they are working on getting it listed on the Federal Register, a National honor.

He and his students are revisiting the exterior of the mansion. All windows need to be re-glazed and painted. Rotted gutters and downspouts are being replaced by copper, section by section, to be historically correct.

Rob reported that the Zimmermans from across Route 222 are working the Gruber land across Hottenstein Road and are trying to buy it.

Terry recognized former Secretary, Russel Hottenstein's 70^{th} birthday coming up on June 17. He also thanked Russel for making all the arrangements for the reunion.

2015 Winterthur Tour, The Hottenstein - Fraktur Room

Organized by Mary Harriette Hottenstein Rensch and prior to the Hottenstein Reunion last year, 36 family members toured of Winterthur, the duPont Estate in Wilmington, Delaware. Special arrangements were made to see the Fraktur Room, with its Pennsylvania German furniture and mottled blue painted woodwork. This room, its windows, doors, and all woodworking detail, including its furniture, are from the second floor parlor of the Hottenstein homestead. The room was moved to Winterthur in 1954. This tour included a special exhibit of Pennsylvania German colorful folk art, including decorated manuscripts (fraktur), textiles, and pottery. The Fraktur Room is not normally open to the public and included with tours of Winterthur.



The tour included time in other rooms, including a typical Pennsylvania German kitchen of the early 1800s in the Fraktur area of Winterthur. We

were shown the Fraktur area in small groups, enabling us to circulate and experience the colorful life of our ancestors must have had. However, and because we were told it is "our" room, we all had extra time in the Fraktur room; we could feel its grandeur. Rob Reynolds and his family, Jennette and Reanna, curators of the Hottenstein Mansion, participated in the tour and the exhibit providing additional insight. There are pictures in the Hottenstein homestead showing the detailed effort that was taken to move the artifacts from the second parlor for transporting to Winterthur.

During the tour, it was explained that the dimensions of the room at Winterthur, into which the Hottenstein parlor artifacts were to be placed, were not sufficient to



accommodate the room as it had been in the Hottenstein homestead. We learned that an outside masonry wall was reconstructed and extended a matter of inches, to accommodate, without jeopardizing the integrity, of all of the woodwork, moldings, and windows, exactly as they had been in the Hottenstein homestead.

The planning and tour arrangements made by Harriette Rensch for our visit to Winterthur are greatly appreciated; it was a grand day.

Special arrangements may be made for family members to visit the Fraktur Room, the second floor parlor that was moved from the Hottenstein homestead. When visiting Winterthur, please call ahead with the date of your arrival, explain you are Hottenstein family member, and request your tour include the Fraktur Room – the Hottenstein Room.

2015 Hottenstein Mansion Report:

Excerpted from the Annual Report for 2015 on the Hottenstein Mansion prepared by Robert W. Reynolds, Ph.D. prepared for the Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County and delivered to the Trust, March 2016.

Hottenstein Mansion Maintenance

During fall of 2015 with the failure of the water supply to the Hottenstein Mansion, a new water system was installed. The submersible pump, water tank, and related gauges, wiring, switches, and seals were replaced. The well head is located about 5 feet below the ground grade outside of the house in a small room with a steel cover. Well testing indicted its depth at 178' containing about 20' of water. The new water supply installation is expected to be serviceable for twenty to twenty-five years.

During the annual furnace servicing, all sections of the smoke pipe between the furnace and the chimney were replaced. The first floor bathroom project moved forward with the purchase of a toilet, sink, faucets, and accessories. Finishing of this bathroom will be done during the 2016-2017 winter. A new kitchen faucet was installed.

A lawn service keeps the grounds mowed and trimmed. In addition, shrubs and trees are trimmed. Flower beds most prone to and overcome with weeds are being replaced with grass.

House Restoration Projects Planned, Five Year Project Goals

Over the next block of five years, the goal is to work on one interior project each winter, and a major exterior project each spring or summer. This includes interior winter maintenance repairs and working on one room at a time to restore and renew finishes. When the weather turns warm the projects will contribute to renewing all exterior painted finishes and the needed repairs and restoration work to go much further than the first time building exteriors were painted. Highlights of the next five years include:

Spring/Summer 2016

Restore the exterior of the rear kitchen wing. Complete substantial carpentry repairs to door frame, pintel holes on east window, and right rear cornice. Rebuild door to crawl space. Install new half round gutters and conical spouting to existing roof shanks. Install new wooden storm door. Prep woodwork, shutters, and doors as needed, re-glaze windows, and paint all woodwork white.

Winter 2017

Repair plaster in first floor bathroom. Stiffen floor underneath toilet and doorway. Replace Formica with

zinc sheeting for countertop. Install new sink, faucets, and hardware for vanity. Restore window seat and reimagine lattice feature. Prep and paint plaster and woodwork. Replace outlet with GFI and light switch with new.

Winters 2018-2020

Repair and repaint the first floor bedroom and kitchen in the mansion.

Spring/Summer 2018-2020

- -Continue our way around the house and outbuildings making carpentry repairs and renewing paint finishes.
- -Redesign rear wall of modern connector between the kitchen ell and the summer kitchen with more appropriate materials.
- -Repair and repaint exteriors of the garage, outhouse, bake house, root cellar, summer kitchen, and Doctor's office.
- -Upgrading of inaccurate woodwork around front entrance reconstruction.
- -Slate roof repairs
