2019 Hottenstein Reunion --Hottenstein Mansion Open House and Picnic to be Sunday, June 9th,

The 83nd Hottenstein Reunion, the family picnic gathering, will be held on Sunday, June 9, 2019, beginning at Hottenstein Mansion, on Route 222, east of Kutztown, Pennsylvania. The Reunion this year will be in two phases and two locations. The Reunion will begin with an Open House at the Hottenstein Mansion beginning at 11:00:AM; the Picnic will follow, using the meeting facilities of the Masonic Hall just five (5) miles west of the Hottenstein Mansion on Route 222. All are welcome.

Hottenstein Mansion Open House

The Reunion will begin in the morning with the Open House at the Hottenstein Mansion. Plan to arrive at 11:00 AM to visit and tour the Hottenstein Home. Rob and Jennette Reynolds have invited us to an open house which they describe as the home of the Hottenstein family. We will be the guests of Dr. Reynolds, his family, and the Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County. Dr. Reynolds is the curator of the Mansion; he and his family reside in the home. Tours and explanations of the rooms, the home and the property, the historical architecture, and artifacts will be provided. It is also a time when family members visit, socialize and share experiences. The Open House will occur from 11:00 AM to 12:30 PM.

Parking is on the west side on Hottenstein Road, which is on the west side of the Hottenstein Mansion. Limited parking is available for handicapped and those needing assistance in the parking area on the east side of the Hottenstein Mansion.

The Hottenetein Reunion Picnic will begin at 1:00 PM at the Masonic Hall in Kutztown. The Reunion Picnic will be traditional catered family picnic, as has

Hottenstein Mansion Open House

Parking at the Hottenstein Mansion will be on the West side of and along Hottenstein Road. Hottenstein Road is adjacent to and west of the Mansion location and intersects with Route 222. Please look for signs indicting Hottenstein Road. After turning on to Hottenstein Road, proceed past the Mansion, turn around, and park on the West side of the road or facing South toward Route 222.

Handicapped parking and parking for those with limited mobility will be provided in the parking area on the east side of the Mansion.

2018 Hottenstein Family Reunion Meeting Minutes June 10, 2018, At the Mansion and the Masonic Hall, Kutztown, Pennsylvania

The 82nd Annual Hottenstein Reunion was held at the Hottenstein Mansion in Kutztown, PA on June 10, 2018 with 55 persons attending.

The Reunion began with an open house in the Hottenstein Homestead. During the open house, Rob Reynolds showed us the new wood stove he installed in the kitchen, which makes the room livable in the winter and actually warms the bedroom above which never could be slept in in the Winter months before. He also showed us new photos of the second David in the Mansion and Commander David Hottenstein.

Then due to inclement weather that was then forecast to not let up, the venue for the reunion was changed from the Mansion to the Social Room in the Masonic Lodge Crystal Cave Road in Kutztown, thanks to Russel who is a Mason and member of the Lodge.

Terry called the meeting to order at 1:32 P.M. and began by thanking everyone for making the change in venue. Secretary Bob Hottenstein gave the blessing and the indoor picnic began. The catered meal consisted of fried chicken, roast fresh ham, green beans, baked limas, potatoes au gratin, tossed salad, fruit salad, rolls and butter and strawberries and ice cream for dessert. Beverages included iced tea, lemonade, and bottled water.

The business meeting commenced at 2:20 P.M. and Terry began by introducing Eleanor Shaner, representing the Trust. He thanked Rob, Jeanette and Reanna for their hospitality at the Mansion.

Terry then passed out the Historian and Treasurer's reports. The Secretary's report was printed in the newsletter mailed to everyone. All reports were accepted as presented. We then observed a minute of silence remembering all those we have lost in the past year. It was mentioned that Elizabeth H. Hall had four generations of her family in attendance.

Dave Hutton spoke about his Civil War interests about Solomon J. Hottenstein, with his Union regiment, and their capture by Confederate soldiers. From this, the regiment escaped, and in the process, Solomon Hottenstein captured the Confederate flag. The regiment made their way to Union army front lines where Solomon Hottenstein presented the Confederate flag to a Union general. In recognition of this, Solomon J. Hottenstein received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Joyce Hottenstein talked about the possibility of a Hottenstein Heritage Tour to Germany in the fall of 2019, if sufficient interest occurred. Locations and events associated with our heritage were described. Sylvia Talmadge, who had participated on tour in 1977, reminisced on the activities then experienced.

Gloria Gibble, a new friend of the Hottenstein Reunion, told us about Ginny Craven, who is the first Hottenstein descendant member of the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR). Gloria spoke about the importance of family members in maintaining, preserving, and enabling access to family records. Gloria, from Nevada, was able to be with us as she traveled to historic genealogic meetings and doing genealogical research on the East Coast.

Hottenstein Property Surrounding Initiatives -- Rob Reynolds spoke about the status of adjoining properties, the traffic circle to be constructed at Long Lane Road, and his observations regarding the governmental initiatives underway for the zoned industrial development of the lands around the Hottenstein property.

Talked of window glass replacement on due to a BB, a tennis ball, storms and rot.

2018 Hottenstein Mansion Report

Excerpted from the Annual Report for 2017 on the Hottenstein Property Management prepared by Robert W. Reynolds, Ph.D. for the Historic Preservation Trust of Berks County, January 2019.

Projects Completed

1. The roughly laid stone steps from the patio to the yard were replaced by three large sections of limestone installed by a stone mason. He laid a base under the steps and worked the edges of the stone with a hammer and chisel to obtain a clean dressed line. He pointed the side wall of the patio where needed seen in these views.





2. Based upon the recommendations of a conditions report, new copper gutters and downspouts were placed upon the front cornice of the house, and west and rear kitchen ell. The east side of the ell received gutters and downspouts in 2017. The real cornice of the mansion main block remains in galvanized material as the condition remains good without leaks.





The downspout of the front gutter requires a 45-degree elbow to extend to the ground. This will be done in late February. Spouting located to not cover dates or carved water table in front cornerstones.

- 3. A painter completed four sets of sash and shutters on the east gable of the mansion, and replaced several cracked and broken window panes in other locations. Linseed oil paints utilized now on all new exterior work as done on rear ell previously.
- 4. Reimbursed Trust for errors in property tax payments.
- 5. Hired new firm to manage grass and grounds. Took down apple tree near Hottenstein Road as its branches kept growing in the way of clear site lines for people pulling out onto 222.



Five Year Projection

Over the next five years we plan to complete exterior carpentry repairs and painting of all building exteriors, replication of the outhouse, and remodeling and upgrading of the garage. Inside the mansion the first and second floor bathrooms shall be updated, and the finishes will be updated. Paint analysis of the mansion warrants investigation by the Hottenstein Committee.
